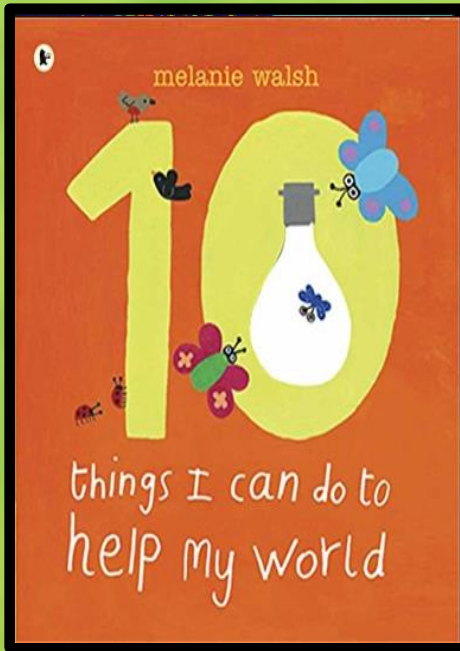


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The Wider Curriculum

- Science – Planting seeds. How does this help our world? Could you organise different materials into different categories of the 3 R's (Reuse, Refuse, Recycle).
- Geography – Create a map (this could be of your house, or a walk on outdoor exercise or somewhere made up) Can you represent where all the recycling bins are and give instructions on how to get there.
- History –
- Art – The pages in this book create suspense whilst allowing us to predict what the next thing will be to help the world. Can you illustrate your own page to tell us what something is that you do to help the world? (Don't forget to think about how the words are laid out)
- DT – Using rubbish can you create something which could help you? You can use toilet roll tubes to create coasters. – (Video of all the different things to do with toilet roll tubes)
- Music – Using the words from the book start to create a song. You can do this to a melody that you already know OR you could create your own melody. We can't wait to see your performances.

Maths Ideas

- Measure 2 metres (the distance advised for social distancing rules) in your house or garden. How many different ways can you measure this? Think about what units you could use...
- Captain Tom has raised millions of pounds by walking laps of his garden. Measure the perimeter of your garden and see how many laps you can walk. Work out your total distance.
- Research how each small activity in the book helps the environment. Most of them have an estimated value (e.g. turning off a light). If you did this every day for 1 week/1 month/1 year, work out how much money/electricity/carbon emissions you would save. Think about what calculation you will have to do.
- Write your own maths word problems about the book. Can you use all 4 operations? $+$ $-$ \times \div
Challenge: Can you make one of your problems incorrect and see if a family member can spot the mistake?

- Adapt the book to talk about 10 things that you do.
- Up-level the sentences in the book. Adding adjectives and adverbs to make the more exciting.
- Writing instructions on how we can follow the 10 things that can help the world with an audience of KS1.
- Develop a debate 'For v Against' recycling. Think of 3 ideas for each argument and decide your own opinion. You could even have a debate with somebody at home!
- Write a speech about climate change and what we can do to help (use Greta Thunberg to help inspire you).
- Write a letter to Miss Smith to persuade her to make changes to school to help the environment.
- Design a persuasive poster telling people the 10 things they can do to help the environment.
